## About Glatopa (glatiramer acetate injection) and GlatopaCare® patient support services



### Indication

Glatopa® (glatiramer acetate injection) is indicated for the treatment of patients with relapsing-forms of multiple sclerosis.

# What is Glatopa®?

Glatopa (glatiramer acetate injection) is an FDA-approved, substitutable generic that is therapeutically equivalent to Copaxone® (glatiramer acetate injection). **That means it is made with the same active ingredient found in Copaxone®.**

## More about Glatopa

- Glatiramer acetate, the same active ingredient found in Glatopa, has been used to treat relapsing-forms of multiple sclerosis for over 20 years
- Glatopa is given under the skin (subcutaneous injection), and may be administered with the Glatopaject® injection device
- More than 14,000 patients have been prescribed once-daily Glatopa 20 mg/mL, which has been available since 2015
- Glatopa is made in the USA

## Insurance and Benefits Information

GlatopaCare Representatives will assist you in understanding your insurance benefits. They can also help you determine the most convenient way to receive your 3-times-a-week 40 mg/mL or once-daily 20 mg/mL Glatopa prescription.

### \*Glatopa Co-Pay Program Eligibility

The Glatopa Co-Pay Program provides up to \$9,000 in annual Co-Pay support for Glatopa prescriptions. This program is not health insurance. This program is for insured patients only; uninsured cash-paying patients are not eligible. Patients are not eligible if prescriptions are paid, in whole or in part, by any state or federally funded programs, including but not limited to Medicare (including Part D, even in the coverage gap) or Medicaid, Medigap, VA, DOD, or TriCare, or private indemnity, or HMO insurance plans that reimburse you for the entire cost of your prescription drugs, or where prohibited by law. Card may not be combined with any other rebate, coupon, or offer. Card has no cash value. Sandoz reserves the right to rescind, revoke, or amend this offer without further notice.

This reaction can involve flushing (feeling of warmth and/or redness), chest tightness or pain with heart palpitations, fast heartbeat, anxiety, and trouble breathing.

## Injection training at home or over the phone

Your GlatopaCare Nurse Trainer can show you how to use the Glatopaject injection device and give you tips and pointers to improve your injection experience.

The Glatopaject injection device works with the Glatopa® (glatiramer acetate injection) prefilled syringe. It's designed to work like other injection devices on the market, so using Glatopaject should feel familiar to patients switching from Copaxone® (glatiramer acetate injection).



## 24/7 Nurse Support

GlatopaCare Nurses are available any time of day or night to provide answers to questions related to Glatopa and guidance about self-injection and proper injection technique.

### Important Safety Information (cont'd)

These symptoms generally appear within minutes of an injection, last about 15 minutes, and do not require specific treatment. During the postmarketing period, there have been reports of patients with similar symptoms who received emergency medical care. **If symptoms become severe, call the emergency phone number in your area.** Call your doctor right away if you develop hives, skin rash with irritation, dizziness, sweating, chest pain, trouble breathing, or severe pain at the injection site. If any of the above occurs, do not give yourself any more injections until your doctor tells you to begin again.

## Important Safety Information (cont'd)

Chest pain may occur either as part of the immediate postinjection reaction or on its own. This pain should only last a few minutes. You may experience more than one such episode, usually beginning at least one month after starting treatment. Tell your doctor if you experience chest pain that lasts for a long time or feels very intense.

A permanent indentation under the skin (lipoatrophy) or, rarely, necrosis at the injection site may occur, due to local destruction of fat tissue. Be sure to follow proper injection technique and inform your doctor of any skin changes.

### Important Safety Information (cont'd)

The most common side effects in studies of glatiramer acetate injection are redness, pain, swelling, itching, or a lump at the site of injection, flushing, rash, shortness of breath, and chest pain. These are not all of the possible side effects of glatiramer acetate. For a complete list, ask your doctor or pharmacist. Tell your doctor about any side effects you have while taking Glatopa.
